

DINNER SERVED 200 DELEGATES

Bishop Bullard Speaker at
Latter Day Saints'
Convention.

ORDAIN A NEW ELDER

Ratify Purchase of Missouri
Property for \$50,000.

More than 200 delegates representing the southern New England district attended the second session of the annual district conference of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ, Latter Day Saints, held Sunday in the local church. The Sunday session opened at 9 o'clock with a prayer service led by Bishop Richard Bullard. At 11 o'clock the institute meeting was held under the direction of Miss Lucie Sears, leader of the District Women's Department.

At 12:30 dinner was served to the delegates in Grand Army Hall by members of the church. At 2 o'clock baptism was given and at 2:30 Edmund J. Gliazer of Independence, Mo., spoke. Mr. Gliazer took as his topic: "An Ensign to the Nations." He stressed the point that "the church of Christ must prove its worth by meeting social needs."

"Vision" was the subject Bishop Bullard took for his evening sermon. He gave an interesting talk on his experiences in England. At the evening service Alma Whipple was ordained to the office of elder by Apostle Gliazer and High Priest J. D. Suttill.

"The Religious Training of Children" was explained by Mrs. J. W. Roberts at the evening service, together with a talk on leadership by Miss Lucie Sears of New Bedford. The singing was led by James Houghton of the Harvard Glee Club and the New England Conservatory of Music.

The purchase of the Swope property in Independence, Mo., for \$50,000, which was explained at the Saturday evening service, was ratified by the delegates. The principle of stewardship by which each church "works for all and all for each" was adopted at the convention.

The conference, which closed Sunday evening, was one of the most successful held in years. It showed that the church has prospered greatly in the past 12 months.
