In reply to yours of
yesterday enquiring about estab-
lishing a "Salmon & Trout fishery"
in Bass River, I may be able
to save you a journey to Boston
by writing.

There is no way that I
know, of making a salmon river
here - nor do I remember it
(I have often been there) as remark-
ably adapted for trout.

For salmon, you must have
extensive breeding grounds - usually
hill-streams, running through
woods, and with gravel bottoms.

It is difficult, or impossible, to
make an estuary - which never
has carried salmon - into a
salmon stream.

Trout you might have, in lim-
ited numbers - but here
again nature comes in. Bass
River has never been prolific
in trout, compared with Mashpee,
and it probably never will be.

My advice would be to
concentrate your care on Alewives,
perch, eels, school-bass and
the like; which, if judiciously
cared for, will never fail.

If you still wish to see
me, I am almost always at
