

## Death of Scotter P. Bangs.

Died in South Wellfleet, July 21st, at the home of his niece, Mrs. J. Y. Gill, after a long and painful illness, Mr. Scotter P. Bangs, son of the late Seymour and Annie M. Bangs, at the age of 65 years, 5 months, 8 days. Mr. Bangs was born in Eastham and learned the carpenters trade from his father. Dec. 6th, 1857, he married Julia Nickerson, daughter of Hatsel and Sarah Nickerson. He worked at his trade until about 1870, when he, with his brother, moved to Chelsea and was tollman on the Winnisimit Ferry for about seven years, then went to Chicago where he lived about four years, then in the early eighties he, with his brother, J. H. Bangs, bought a sheep ranch in Spearville, Kansas. About 1888 they sold out there and returned to Chicago. Soon after J. H. Bangs moved to South Omaha where he was in the employ of the G. F. Swift Company, which position he held until his death, which occurred July 19, 1897. Scotter returned to Eastham and worked at his trade as carpenter until about two years ago. Owing to failing health he had to give up active labor. Since then his health has been gradually failing. Jan. 8, 1900, he lost his mother, and Feb. 24th his wife died. He still continued to live at the old home until last November, when he closed his house and went to live with his niece. Mr. Bangs was a good neighbor, generous to a fault, kind and obliging to all, always ready to accommodate, and to the writer of this a true friend, and not only him alone, but the whole family, parents and children I count among my dearest friends, having been intimately acquainted with them from my earliest recollections. Funeral services were held in the M. E. Church, Wednesday, July 23d, conducted by Rev. Mr. Rackett from Orleans. Burial services were conducted by the I. O. O. F. of which he was a member.
